PROJECTS

Christalis Home

We moved into our new home in February 2016. We started the year with 21 children but resettled 6 of them. However, we are still providing their education, medical care and any other needs they may have. Jackie, one of our girls, is starting to work towards her Social Work Degree. Mugabo scored first in his class out of 111 for all three terms of his first year in secondary school. We also took in 4 new babies and 6 children from the streets.





Assistance Program

Our assistance program grew from 116 to 250. Two girls and two boys graduated at the top of their class and in Division 1.

We were able to help eight children with medical needs this year. The biggest medical need was open-heart surgery for a 4 year old child with a congenital defect. We also helped children with mental disorders, rehab needs, epilepsy, palliative care and other needs.

Family Development Program

We were able to provide food, clothing and mattresses to 4-5 families who are very poor. We were also able to provide materials and land for cultivation for one of the families to help them increase their income level.







TRUCK AND VAN
